# Opening Plenary: People, Power & Possibilities – Redistricting and the Fight for Fair Representation

Time: 9:00 a.m. - 10:30 a.m.

This session centers the foundational work of the people in combating the intensifying attacks on representation and democratic infrastructure. Right now, Texas is ground zero for both suppression and resistance. The redistricting landscape, combined with increasingly hostile legislative environments, demands stronger coordination, better data, and deeper investment. When redistricting is used to manipulate the will of the people, it's gerrymandering. It undermines democracy and stifles the voice of voters. This session will highlight grassroots and legal strategies to

challenge gerrymandering and voter dilution, community organizing models that protect communities of interest, and opportunities to strengthen long-term civic infrastructure across state lines.

## Session #1:

# From Base to Bench: Growing Latine Leadership Through the RJ Academy

How do we move our gente from canvasser to candidate, from base to bench? COLOR Action Fund's RJ Academy: Political Power Track is a bold and replicable leadership pipeline rooted in culture, political clarity, and reproductive justice. Launched in response to escalating threats to democracy, the RJ Academy trains multigenerational Latine leaders in campaign strategy, issue advocacy, and electoral organizing, equipping them to lead with power and purpose.

This session is a collaborative invitation to C4 organizations and funders. Together, we will explore how culturally rooted political education can transform grassroots engagement into long-term power-building.

Participants will walk through the program model, reflect on the challenges facing BIPOC-led Community of Practice (C4) organizations, and help shape shared strategies for sustaining leadership pipelines in hostile political climates. This is a case study and a call to action, and your participation is crucial.

Investing in Resilience: How AI Can Futureproof Movement Infrastructure

Grassroots organizations are facing a rising wave of disinformation, legal threats, and digital vulnerabilities—but they're often forced to fight with outdated or under-resourced tools. In this session, funders will get an inside look at Civic Sentry, a next-generation AI-powered platform built to help movement groups stay safe, strategic, and ahead of fast-moving challenges.

Civic Sentry is not just another tech tool. It's designed with frontline needs in mind—using storytelling, pattern recognition, and strategic modeling to help leaders spot risks early, respond to attacks, and strengthen their internal infrastructure. No technical background is required.

This session will show how AI—used wisely—can become a force multiplier for justice. Participants will explore how to support these tools not as one-off projects, but as long-term infrastructure that protects and powers the future of organizing.

### Session #1:

Co-Governance Between Base Building Organizations and Elected Officials: A Path to Shifting Power and Redefining Public Safety (Southern Movement Committee)

Co-governance is not just a strategy for reform—it's a vehicle for shifting power and meeting material needs. It centers Black, working-class communities as architects of public policy and community safety. When base-building organizations and elected officials enter into accountable, power-sharing relationships, policy is shaped by the people most impacted by systemic harm. This model rejects the myth that public safety comes from policing and punishment. Instead, safety is defined as investing in community-driven solutions like housing, healing, education, and economic justice as defined and driven by those most impacted by harm. Co-governance turns grassroots demands into long-term infrastructure, ensuring that decisions are rooted in community wisdom, not political convenience. It's how we move from demands to dual power—and from systemic harm to collective liberation.

## Session #2:

The Front Door is a Frontline: Canvassers as Strategists, Storytellers, and Disinformation Responders

In 2020, progressive organizations launched unprecedented canvassing operations in Georgia—but lacked the funds to replicate them in 2024. This interactive skillshare highlights new research from focus groups with canvassers about the role they play in political trust, disinformation response, and voter engagement. Drawing on the belief that those closest to the doors are often closest to the truth, we'll explore how canvassers view their work—and how organizations can design field programs that treat canvassers as strategic partners, not just messengers. Participants will engage in a hands-on activity used in canvasser disinformation training and leave

with concrete tools to improve field staff development, messaging feedback loops, and campaign infrastructure built for long-term power.

## Session #3:

Whatever It Takes: Cocktails, Hookah, Carnivals, and Bike Rides that Get Voters to the Polls

Fire up the coals for the hookah, pour a shot of Henny, and let's discuss the most pressing issues impacting our community in this election cycle! In this interactive discussion, hear from Engaged Voters Founder and Executive Director Tanisha Manning, J.D., and EV Civic Engagement Consultant Dr. Felicia Harris, about the unconventional yet effective tactics driving voter engagement and outreach in Southeast Houston, one of the areas most targeted for gerrymandering in the state. Known as the home of popular neighborhoods, including Houston's Third Ward, Sunnyside, and Crestmont Park, Southeast Houston is rich in opportunities for mobilizing Black voters, who historically have had low to mid-level civic engagement. Through culturally resonant outreach, Engaged Voters has built a network of emerging civic leaders, empowering 18to 35-year-olds to become informed voters and agents of change within their communities. From their popular lounge series, "Cocktails and Conversations," to their innovative "Bike to the Polls," and their viral podcast bringing real talk to real people, the EV team will discuss the intentional strategies and tactics used to meet constituents where they are, address their questions and valid concerns about the political process, and increase political participation in communities with low to mid-level turnout rates.

### Session #4:

Developing Coalition AI: How Grassroots Progressive Groups are Building Power in New Mexico with Artificial Intelligence

This session will explore the New Mexico Progressive Artificial Intelligence System (NM-PAIS), the first generative AI platform for coalition organizing, including its origins, current status, and vision for the future. We will cover initial AI experiments by Progress Now New Mexico (PNNM) and Organizers in the Land of Enchantment (OLÉ), from developing NM-PAIS with the Center for Civic Policy (CCP), to the planned expansion to the full 45-member New Mexico Civic Engagement Table.

Attendees will leave with actionable frameworks for coalition AI solutions for their own regions or issue coalitions. The NM-PAIS model demonstrates how AI technology can strengthen rather than replace human organizing, amplifying people's power against elite interests while maintaining progressive values.

The session will explore key themes, including:

- → AI FOR ORGANIZING: How PNNM initially leveraged AI to combat Project 2025 misinformation and how OLÉ applied expanded capacity to passing key housing legislation.
- → EXECUTION: How PNNM, OLÉ, and CCP funded, developed, and rolled out the tool.
- → NM-PAIS FEATURES: How NM-PAIS is leveraging Change Agent AI, a movement-aligned alternative to ChatGPT, to save time on tasks including writing, data analysis, strategy development, translation, and more.
- → ETHICAL CONSIDERATIONS: How NM-PAIS's founding organizations address ethical concerns around privacy, bias, and climate.

**Putting Power to Purpose: Infrastructure for Collective Liberation** 

Too often, the progressive data and tech infrastructure has been built around exclusion—forgetting and actively harming Black communities through disinvestment, underservice, limited access, and lack of representation in leadership. This session will explore what it means to prioritize the Black experience in the design, governance, and access of shared infrastructure by creating a collaborative vehicle for BIPOC organizations and demanding investment/prioritization from allies in our space. We will examine how equitable access to a shared infrastructure and communal data projects can redress historical injustices, foster resilience, and build collective power. We will confront the impacts of continuing to sideline the Black experience: reinforcing structural inequities, deepening mistrust, and perpetuating systems that fail us over and over again. Through discussion, case studies, and strategic thinking, this session challenges participants to imagine infrastructure not just as an option, but as a shared commitment for our future.

By the end of the session, participants will collaboratively create strategies to mobilize identified resources toward achieving radical, inclusive change.

By sharing best practices and expertise, we aim to create a supportive space for stakeholders to unite across identity groups and work together towards a more just and equitable future.
